


Coastal Storm Today into Tonight

What Has Changed?

✓ Snow totals lowered across far SE NJ and southern DE














Main Points			
<u>Hazard</u>	<u>Impacts</u>	<u>Location</u>	<u>Timing</u>
Snow	Very hazardous driving conditions expected during the day today with heavy snow. Additional power outages and tree damage is likely.	Eastern PA, NJ, DE and northeastern MD.	Today into this evening.
<u>o</u> O Wind	Strong winds could exacerbate any tree and power issues with the snow. Gusts up to 50 mph will be possible near the coast.	Eastern PA, NJ, DE and northeastern MD. The strongest winds should be near the coast.	Through the day time hours.
Coastal Flooding	Minor to moderate flooding with some roads becoming impassable. Potential for minor to moderate property damage adjacent to tidal waterways.	Coastal areas of NJ and DE, and areas along Del Bay and the far lower Del River.	Around high tide today and tonight.
Marine	Storm force wind gusts up to 50 knots.	The coastal waters of NJ and DE, including lower Delaware Bay.	Through late this afternoon.





Summary of the Greatest Impacts











Evolution of precipitation type

- ✓ May continue to see a wintry mix of rain, sleet, snow, and freezing rain for areas south and east of the I-95 corridor through the morning hours. Elsewhere, mostly snow is expected today
- ✓ Snow, heavy at times, is expected this morning. through late this afternoon. Most of the snow accumulation will occur at that time.
- Snow should taper off tonight from southwest to northeast.






Snowfall Forecast

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Important Notes:

- This only includes additional snow as of Wednesday morning; snow and ice from Tuesday and Tuesday night is not included in this graphic.
- ✓ Most of the snow is expected through late this afternoon. Snow rates of 2 to 3 inches per hour are possible under the heaviest snow bands
- ✓ The snow will be wet and heavy, difficult to shovel, and it will collect on trees and wires.












Maximum Coastal Flooding (Today & Tonight)



- Minor to moderate flooding is expected along much of the NJ and DE coast and on Del Bay with the high tides today and tonight.
- Minor flooding should reach far upper Delaware Bay and the lower Delaware River this afternoon and tonight.
- ✓ This graphic shows the expected degree of flooding on the oceanfront, bays, and estuaries along the highlighted areas.

Event Summary

- ✓ Heavy snow and significant impacts are expected through this evening. Snowfall rates of 2 to 3 inches per hour will be possible under the heaviest snow bands. Travel is not recommended.
- ✓ This will be a heavy, wet snow which will be difficult to shovel and will stick to trees and power lines. This, combined with the strong winds, could lead to power outages and tree damage.
- ✓ Coastal flooding will be a concern through the next two high tide cycles. Minor to moderate coastal flooding is expected with the high tide cycles today and tonight.
- ✓ Storm force winds and rough seas are expected on the coastal waters of NJ and DE, and on Delaware Bay through this afternoon.
- ✓ Snow will move out of the region from southwest to northeast overnight tonight.
